from the pastor

Dear Good People of Saint Bernadette,

This past week we celebrated the Solemnity of the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It always surprises me because every year it is deep in the season of Lent and we are focusing on being reconciled to God preparing for the upcoming passion, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

Doing the math, of course, Jesus is conceived by the Holy Spirit nine months before his birth — March 25. We just aren't thinking about Christmas right now.

It occurs to me that the day deserves more significance than it receives, and could even qualify as a holy day. Culturally, we are conditioned to think of Christmas and Easter as the high feastdays the Church gathers around with special solemnity. Think of it: although Jesus' birth and resurrection are central to faith, would not the incarnation, God entering into our humanity in Christ be as important, if not more, than his birth? By the time he is born, Jesus has already been living our humanity for nine months.

The feastday is titled the Annunciation because it makes very clear that Mary conceived by the Holy Spirit and this was confirmed by the message of the angel Gabriel, thus strengthening the dogma of the one person/two natures of Jesus. But it is the moment of conception that is the beginning of this new life of incarnation.

I think this would be the perfect opportunity for the Church to use this feastday as a teaching moment. *Didactic* feastdays (like the Assumption of Mary or Immaculate Conception) are obligatory because they teach Church dogma through the living practice of the Church. One of the concepts one learns in theology is *lex orandi, lex credendi,* the law of praying is the law of believing.

This is the absolutely perfect feast for the Church to proclaim the sacredness of human life. A pro-life feastday rooted in the story of Jesus himself, no one would deny that the moment of Jesus' conception by the Holy Spirit was the event of the Incarnation. All life is precious. This is the Fourth Sunday of Lent, traditionally known as Laetare Sunday. *Laetare*, means *to rejoice*. It is proposed to us as a disposition for today, but it may not be your first reaction to Lent. We tend to tone down our celebrations during Lent to reflect a more meditative, even somber, mood. Sorrow for sin, penance, fasting. You may have noticed we haven't been lighting the stained glass in the sanctuary, a kind of fasting for the eyes, as no recessional hymn is a kind of fasting for the ears.

But in the middle of it all, if you seek it, there still exists the kind of joy that is unshakeable even in adversity. Jesus certainly wasn't happy on the cross, but there was a joy he sustained because he knew he was accomplishing his Father's will. The little sacrifices we make (or the large ones, too) can be united to Christ in his self-gift to our loving Father, and we can know his joy and make it ours.

One last thing — someone asked me last weekend what the rocks were doing in front of the altar. I realized we put out the bucket of rocks and never told anyone about it. It is something I started at my last parish and brought it here, so most probably know about this already. I call it "Living Stones" and here is how it works: During the season of Lent, approach someone who has left or been away from the Church and invite them back. After you have personally made this invitation, you then take a stone from the container and place it in front of the altar.

The other thing I never mentioned is that those stones are there as a reminder that we must pray for these people after the invitation has been made. When you are at Mass, pray for the people represented by these stones. It might just be the prayer that will help them to feel welcome again. And tell them they are being remembered! In a certain sense, it will be like they have already been present to us if they decide to give faith another chance.

Like the feast of the Annunciation, in the silence of Lent allow yourself to be surprised by a moment of joy this weekend as with hope we observe the coming feasts.

Fasting, Abstinence, and Prayer: Soup Suppers & Stations of the Cross

The origins of the Sacred Triduum

The title "Paschal Triduum," used to refer to the feast days of the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ, has been a relatively recent expression, probably dating back to the 1930s. However, at the end of the fourth century, Saint Ambrose already spoke of a Triduum Sacrum referring to the different elements of Christ's Paschal Mystery, the three days he suffered, he rested, and he rose again.

The historical significance of the death of Christ impelled the primitive Church to celebrate liturgically this salvific event. A memorial rite was installed in accordance with the express desire of our Lord that the Paschal Mystery be sacramentally renewed. "Do this in memory of me."

During the early phases of the life of the Church, Easter was celebrated at the Mass every Sunday. Soon after, in the second century, one Sunday during the year was reserved specifically for the celebration.

The Church began to celebrate the Paschal Triduum more systematically when it started to relive historically the mysteries of Christ's life, starting in Jerusalem, where they actually took place.

Each celebration of the Paschal Triduum contains its particular character: the twilight of Holy Thursday commemorates the institution of the Eucharist; Good Friday is dedicated especially to the passion and death of Jesus on the Cross; on Holy Saturday, the Church meditates the repose of Jesus in the sepulcher. Finally, in the Paschal Vigil, the faithful relive the glory of the resurrection.

Holy Thursday

The evening Mass of the Lord's Supper formally opens the Paschal Triduum. The Church of Jerusalem, in the fourth century, already started celebrating the commemorative Eucharist of the Last Supper and the institution of the sacrament of the Holy Sacrifice on the Cross:

Originally, this celebration was observed at Golgotha, in the *Martyrium* Basilica built over the place of the Cross (now within the Church of the Holy Sepulchre), which confirms the intimate relation of the eucharistic celebration with Jesus' holy sacrifice on the cross.

At the end of the fourth century, many western churches adopted this tradition. It was not until the seventh century that the earliest Roman testimonies about the celebration were discovered.

Good Friday

Good Friday commemorates the passion and death of Christ. Two documents from the third century (the *Traditio Apostolica* of Saint Hippolytus and the *Didaskalia Apostolorum*) give testimony to the common practice of the early Christians fasting on the Friday and Saturday that precede the Paschal Vigil.

It was not until the fourth century, in Jerusalem, when the first liturgical celebrations of the Passion of our Lord were held: a whole day was allotted for prayer; a procession of the faithful was held from the Cenacle (the place where the column of the Flagellation is also venerated) to Golgotha, where the bishop presented the wooden cross to the people for veneration. In different *stations* during the procession, Passion narratives were read, along with other prayers and psalms.

The oldest testimonies that describe the liturgy on Good Friday in Rome date back to the seventh century (in two distinct traditions, the Gelasian and Gregorian Sacramentaries).

Holy ("Black") Saturday

In the early centuries of the Church, Holy Saturday was observed as a day of absolute fasting in preparation for the Paschal feast. In the 16th century, because of laws for the eucharistic fast, the Vigil began to take place on Saturday morning and the liturgical significance of the ancient fast was lost. Its original form was restored with the reforms of Vatican II. Holy Saturday should be a day of intense prayer for the faithful as they accompany Jesus in silence at the holy sepulcher.

Paschal Vigil

The liturgical celebration of the Pasch of our Lord is found in the very core of Christian worship.

In the second century, the Church started celebrating an annual feast to serve as an actual remembrance of the Passover, although expressed through distinct traditions: one that commemorates the

The origins of the Sacred Triduum continued from page 8

Passion (celebrated on the 14th day of Nissan in the Jewish lunar calendar) and that of the Resurrection (celebrated on the Sunday after the 14th of Nissan, the day of the Resurrection of our Lord). The latter tradition had been practiced in the Church since the early third century.

The Easter Vigil, during the holy night when Christ rose from the dead (Saint Augustine calls this the "Mother of all vigils"), closes the Sacred Triduum and starts the Easter Season, celebrating the glory of the Jesus' resurrection. This single event reveals the mystery of Christ the Savior and the saved Christian. During the ceremony of the Easter Vigil, the baptism of catechumens is celebrated.

As indicated by Saint Augustine in his Sermons (220-221), the celebration of the Holy Vigil should be done throughout the night in such a way that it ends right before the early morning of Sunday. The Paschal Vigil is the heart of the liturgical year in which all celebrations of the mysteries of the life of Christ converge.
