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from the pastor

Dear Good People of Saint Bernadette,

I came across this 2021 article by Kelly Marcum, a writer for the National Catholic Register, addressing the post-pandemic world. I think there are greater things today that people may be fearful of, so I thought I would reprint it here.

The world says it wants you to be fierce. Daily planners and coffee mugs enjoin you to "own your day" and bumper stickers command you to "speak truth to power."

It's all a lie.

The world wants you afraid. The Father of Lies, whose only field of operation is our fallen world, wants you afraid. Alas for him, aside from having already lost the war, he is at a stark disadvantage as he fights. He cannot create — he can only distort. He cannot replace virtue with anything of his own, so he is forced to adapt, to twist the world's definition of good to suit his needs. Our world still values courage — thus you must never think you are actually living in fear. You must feel as though you are indeed being bold and empowered while you cower.

It is insidious fear, whispering lies, that tells a woman she must be able to kill her own child, and that she cannot succeed without that right — but the world says it is empowerment.

It is fear that is preventing an entire generation from committing to marriage and family — the world applauds their freespiritedness.

It is fear of engaging in the world that keeps perfectly healthy individuals living in their two-dimensional bubble behind a Zoom screen — but it has been rebranded as heroic action.

Fortunately, as he has throughout the millennia, God gave the world a saint for such a skittish time as this.

On Oct. 22, 1978, 43 years ago today, Pope St. John Paul II, then the newly-elected Vicar of Christ, looked out at the throng gathered in St. Peter's Square for his inaugural Mass, and urged them: "Be not afraid." These words would become a familiar refrain in his papacy, but in reality, they had long defined his life, and would so until his death in 2005. St. John Paul II was fearless. When he defied the Nazis as part of the Polish cultural resistance, when he spoke tirelessly against the evils of Communism, when he forgave his would-be assassin, and when he spent his final years succumbing to illness, his courage never faltered.

For the nearly three decades he led the Catholic Church, John Paul II's bold proclamation of the faith loomed larger than life, a vibrant witness in a world battered by a century of global wars and genocides. His joy and courage never wavered because he was not their source. Christ was. In that first homily of his papacy, he aptly captured the cultural despair of a post-Christian world, and pointed to the antidote:

"So often today man does not know what is within him, in the depths of his mind and heart. So often he is uncertain about the meaning of his life on this earth. He is assailed by doubt, a doubt which turns into despair. We ask you therefore, we beg you with humility and trust, let Christ speak to man. He alone has words of life, yes, of eternal life."

Throughout his life, John Paul II fought back against a world broken by fear and despair. His life and legacy exist as a great refutation of Satan's lies and fear mongering. Notably however, he did not dwell frequently on the enemy in his words, though he was always aware of the threat. Instead, with unwavering faith in the Resurrection, he lived his life in tremendous joy, even through his long years of suffering and illness.

John Paul II had seen evil in action. He knew precisely where the weakness and violence of men could lead. But he also knew to whom the victory already belonged, and he had no time to waste living in a prison of fear. Moreover, he had no interest in seeing anyone else fall into such snares. Speaking to a crowd of young people in 1999, John Paul II encouraged them:

"Do not be satisfied with mediocrity. ... Do not be afraid to be holy! Have the courage and humility to present yourselves to the world determined to be holy, since full, true freedom is born from holiness. This aspiration will help you discover genuine love, untainted by selfish and alienating permissiveness."

In these troubled times — and no, they are not unprecedented, for plagues, wars, injustices and hedonism are not unique to our age we can thank God for the witness of St. John Paul II, and for the reminder that the victory has already been won.

The Lord be with you.



Second statement by Pope Leo on the situation in Iran

June 22, 2025 (ZENIT News / Vatican City)

Following the US invasion of Iran and the worsening of the war situation in different parts of the world, especially in the Middle East, at noon on Sunday, June 22, Pope Leo made a statement from Saint Peter's Square, in the context of the Angelus address:

"Alarming news continues to arrive from the Middle East, especially from Iran. In this dramatic moment, which includes Israel and Palestine, the daily suffering of the population risks being forgotten, especially in Gaza and other territories, where the need for adequate humanitarian aid is ever more urgent.

"Today more than ever, humanity cries out and asks for peace. It is a cry that demands responsibility and reason, and must not be stifled by the roar of weapons or by rhetorical words that incite conflict.

"Every member of the international community has the moral responsibility to stop the tragedy of war before it becomes an irreparable vortex. There are no 'distant' conflicts when human dignity is at stake."

And he declared: "War does not resolve problems, but rather amplifies them and produces deep wounds in the history of peoples, which take generations to heal. No armed victory can compensate for the pain of mothers, the fear of children, the stolen future. Let diplomacy silence the weapons! Let nations chart their future with works of peace, not with violence or bloody conflicts!"

Just last Wednesday, June 18, Pope Leo raised his voice, also from St. Peter's Square, saying: "The heart of the Church is torn apart by the cries that rise from places at war, in particular from Ukraine, Iran, Israel and Gaza. We must not get used to war!

"On the contrary, we must reject the allure of powerful and sophisticated weapons as a temptation. Indeed, in today's war, 'by employing scientific weapons of every kind, their intrinsic cruelty threatens to lead those who fight to a barbarism far surpassing that of times past" (Vatican Council II, Pastoral Constitution *Gaudium et Spes*, 79).

Therefore, in the name of human dignity and international law, I repeat to those in charge what Pope Francis used to say: war is always a defeat! And with Pius XII: 'Nothing is lost in peace, everything can be lost in war.'''

"Count on the commitment of all of us to stand with you in this challenging hour," says Archbishop Broglio

WASHINGTON - "As your shepherds, your fear echoes in our hearts and we make your pain our own. Count on the commitment of all of us to stand with you in this challenging hour," said Archbishop Timothy P. Broglio, president of the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), addressing the surge in immigration enforcement actions. He offered a reflection on behalf of the bishops of the United States and acknowledged that while law enforcement actions to preserve order and ensure community security are necessary for the common good, we cannot turn a deaf ear to the anxiety and fear in communities.

Archbishop Broglio's reflection follows:

Just before the opening of the special assembly of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops, it seems appropriate to give voice to a profound concern in the hearts of the Shepherds of the Church in our Country.

When he spoke to the young people of Chicago this past weekend, Pope Leo XIV reminded us that at the heart of the Christian faith is an invitation to share in the communion of life and love of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, the first community and based completely on love. The Holy Father also challenged us to be a sign of hope by making the world a better place.

Considering Pope Leo's message, no one can turn a deaf ear to the palpable cries of anxiety and fear heard in communities throughout the country in the wake of a surge in immigration enforcement actions.

Law enforcement actions aimed at preserving order and ensuring community security are necessary for the common good. However, the current efforts go well beyond those with criminal histories. In the context of a gravely deficient immigration system, the mass arrest and removal of our neighbors, friends and family members on the basis of immigration status alone, particularly in ways that are arbitrary or without due process, represent a profound social crisis before which no person of good will can remain silent. The situation is far from the communion of life and love to which this nation of immigrants should strive.

The many actions of protest throughout the country reflect the moral sentiments of many Americans that enforcement alone cannot be the solution to addressing our nation's immigration challenges. While protest and dissent can be a legitimate expression of democratic participation, violence is never acceptable. At the same time, it is good to remember Pope Francis' admonition that 'without equal opportunities the different forms of aggression and conflict will find a fertile terrain for growth and eventually explode' (Evangelii gaudium, 59).

The chronic lack of opportunities for legal status for our immigrant brothers and sisters, together with the growing denial of due process to them, is injurious to human dignity and is a considerable factor in the breakdown of the rule of law. Likewise, unfounded accusations against Catholic service providers, who every day endeavor to provide critical support and care to the most vulnerable, contribute to societal tensions and a growing climate of fear.

On behalf of my brother bishops, I want to assure all of those affected by actions which tear at the fabric of our communities of the solidarity of your pastors. As your shepherds, your fear echoes in our hearts and we make your pain our own. Count on the commitment of all of us to stand with you in this challenging hour.

I acknowledge those in our Catholic service and community organizations working to promote the common good by binding up the wounds of the afflicted. Let those motivated by the urgency of the current moment to work for just and humane solutions to these immigration challenges know of the cooperation and goodwill of the Catholic Bishops of our country.

WASHINGTON - "Como sus pastores, su temor resuena en nuestros corazones y hacemos nuestro su dolor. Cuenten con el compromiso de todos nosotros para acompañarlos en estos momentos difíciles", dijo el Arzobispo Timothy P. Broglio, presidente de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos (USCCB), al abordar el aumento de las medidas de control migratorio. Ofreció una reflexión en nombre de los obispos de Estados Unidos y reconoció que, si bien las medidas de las fuerzas del orden para preservar el orden y garantizar la seguridad comunitaria son necesarias para el bien común, no podemos ignorar la ansiedad y el miedo en las comunidades.

A continuación, la reflexión del Arzobispo Broglio:

Justo antes de la apertura de la asamblea especial de la Conferencia de Obispos Católicos de los Estados Unidos, parece oportuno expresar una profunda preocupación en el corazón de los Pastores de la Iglesia en nuestro país.

Al dirigirse a los jóvenes de Chicago el pasado fin de semana, el Papa León XIV nos recordó que en el corazón de la fe cristiana reside una invitación a compartir la comunión de vida y amor del Padre, el Hijo y el Espíritu Santo, la primera comunidad, basada completamente en el amor. El Santo Padre también nos retó a ser un signo de esperanza, haciendo del mundo un lugar mejor.

Considerando el mensaje del Papa León XIV, nadie puede ignorar los palpables gritos de ansiedad y miedo que se escuchan en comunidades de todo el país tras el aumento de las medidas de control migratorio.

Las acciones de las fuerzas del orden público para preservar el orden y garantizar la seguridad comunitaria son necesarias para el bien común. Sin embargo, los esfuerzos actuales van mucho más allá de quienes tienen antecedentes penales. En el contexto de un sistema migratorio gravemente deficiente, el arresto y la expulsión masivos de nuestros vecinos, amigos y familiares únicamente por su estatus migratorio, particularmente de manera arbitraria o sin el debido proceso, representan una profunda crisis social ante la cual ninguna persona de buena voluntad puede permanecer en silencio. La situación dista mucho de la comunión de vida y amor que esta nación de inmigrantes debería aspirar.

Las numerosas acciones de protesta en todo el país reflejan el sentimiento moral de muchos estadounidenses de que la aplicación de la ley por sí sola no puede ser la solución para abordar los desafíos migratorios de nuestra nación. Si bien la protesta y la disidencia pueden ser una expresión legítima de participación democrática, la violencia nunca es aceptable. Al mismo tiempo, es importante recordar la advertencia del Papa Francisco: «Sin igualdad de oportunidades, las diferentes formas de agresión y conflicto encontrarán un terreno fértil para crecer y, finalmente, explotarán» (Evangelii gaudium, 59).

La falta crónica de oportunidades para obtener un estatus legal para nuestros hermanos y hermanas inmigrantes, junto con la creciente negación del debido proceso, atenta contra la dignidad humana y es un factor considerable en el deterioro del estado de derecho. Asimismo, las acusaciones infundadas contra los proveedores de servicios católicos, quienes a diario se esfuerzan por brindar apoyo y atención esenciales a los más vulnerables, contribuyen a las tensiones sociales y a un creciente clima de temor.

En nombre de mis hermanos obispos, quiero asegurar a todos los afectados por acciones que dañan el tejido de nuestras comunidades la solidaridad de sus pastores. Como sus pastores, su temor resuena en nuestros corazones y hacemos nuestro su dolor. Cuenten con el compromiso de todos nosotros para acompañarlos en este momento difícil.

Reconozco a quienes en nuestras organizaciones católicas de servicio y comunitarias trabajan para promover el bien común curando las heridas de los afligidos. Que quienes se sientan motivados por la urgencia del momento actual a trabajar por soluciones justas y humanas a estos desafíos migratorios sepan de la cooperación y la buena voluntad de los obispos católicos de nuestro país.
