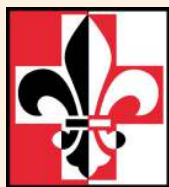

from the pastor

Here is letter from the parish website describing our vision and mission which I wrote ten years ago.

Gathered by God's presence and promise, proclaiming his love by our words and deeds, alive in worship and service, opening doors through dialogue, we journey together in radical trust, unity, and Jesus' mercy.

Dear Good People of Saint Bernadette,

As the different chapters in our lives are written, I recognize one thing that is consistent for myself. I always feel at home at the altar. I am grateful to gather around your beautiful altar with you.

One of the first things I felt compelled to do when I came was to uncover that amazing altar. Someone told me I should write about this – that many of the newer members of the parish might not even know its significance. Ours is the altar at which Saint John Paul II presided on the National Mall in 1979 – it is a world treasure, a sacred relic. There is a little picture of that Mass on the south wall of the vestibule. Over time the green wood seems to have dried, and split, and twisted dramatically which, for me, makes it even more stunning. I imagine the real wood of the cross, which was the first altar. It is an honor for us to celebrate the Mass here.

Of course, the altar is only the starting point. It is the sacred portal where God's eternal love and mercy takes concrete expression in time and space. It is here that the veil in the Holy of Holies is torn top to bottom, where God's dwelling is open to all; he becomes present to us and we encounter him in his Mystery Presence in Christ. As people brought into one with him in baptism, we die with him daily until that day in which we shall rise to new life. In that space between the cross and the tomb we live, continuing the mission of the Father to bring glad tidings to the poor, liberty to captives, sight to the blind, and to those in sorrow, joy.

In this encounter with our loving God, we are left speechless. The love stretches from end to end, the thread that runs through all people who ever have or ever will live. Having been given the knowledge of that love we can do nothing but proclaim it through our actions, offering our life for the spread of this love. That communion of saints gathers at every Mass at every altar in one constant movement of call and response, sacred conversation and exchanging self in communion, singing with angels and belonging to that company of witnesses all present in this moment of eternity. The thread of love binds us with all who have gone before, and all who are yet to be born. We are one, and fully alive.

Translating this sacred banquet into every moment, every relationship we have, every place we go, is the work of disciples who go about seeking constant renewal. Every parish family follows this path described so often by Pope Francis, after the Tradition of the Second Vatican Council. We first must openly acknowledge, encounter each other in welcome and respect, without prejudice, with humility. Soon follows a dialogue of truth, an exchange of knowledge, freely offered and respectfully received. Once we learn of each other, we discover goodness, and relationship. Love is not a concept; it only exists in the fabric of a relationship that has been established and nurtured. Love cannot exist for its own sake, any more than service for serving itself. These can only be authentic if there is a person in relationship who is the object of that love. That person is God.

As God is a community of Persons, so we too, made in his image and likeness, must enter that relationship as a community of persons, each with our gifts and dreams which are our unique contribution to the Body of Christ. We journey together. For this reason, we do not exist for ourselves, but empty ourselves seeking radical trust in God, to speak only the words the Holy Spirit offers, words of unity and mercy.

Our sixth/seventh grade Confirmation teams work together as a group to accomplish three corporal and three spiritual works of mercy. After these are complete, we gather and discuss what happened. "Whom did you serve?" I ask. After listing all the names or groups of people, we find that, at the heart of the work, it is Jesus himself who is served. Then I ask, "Who was it that they encountered?" Realizing that it would not be our names or our personal details but rather our love that anyone would remember, we realize that it is Jesus who serves through us. Community, the Body of Christ, happens when Jesus serves, and Jesus is served.

Each one of us is called to a vital role; no one is left out of God's plan. The full flourishing of a community working together using their gifts is a great expression of Jesus' presence in the world. The Church doesn't exist for herself, but rather that Jesus might be made present to heal the world. So may we be!

Building a virtuous school community

"We are all created and baptized in God's image and are called to reflect him by living virtuously." With this message, Sr. Patricia welcomed Saint Bernadette faculty and staff to a discussion on incorporating and teaching virtues at school.

On May 22, 2026, Saint Bernadette faculty and staff were happy to have Sr. Patricia Helene Earle, IHM, Ph.D., with us again to lead a conversation about the habits and traits of a virtuous person. This visit with Sr. Patricia was a continuation of a workshop held at the beginning of the school year where we focused on Catholic identity. After a half day of school for our Cardinals, faculty and staff gathered for an afternoon of prayer and learning. Sr. Patricia began by leading us in prayer and quiet reflection, helping us slow down from the busyness of the day and become present to God before beginning the workshop.

Throughout the afternoon, Sr. Patricia reminded us that God gives us the gift of

grace through his unconditional love and forgiveness. This gift is freely given, and we are called to share that same grace with others through the way we live each day. She explained that while some virtues are gifts from God placed within our souls, others must be intentionally taught, practiced, and strengthened over time.

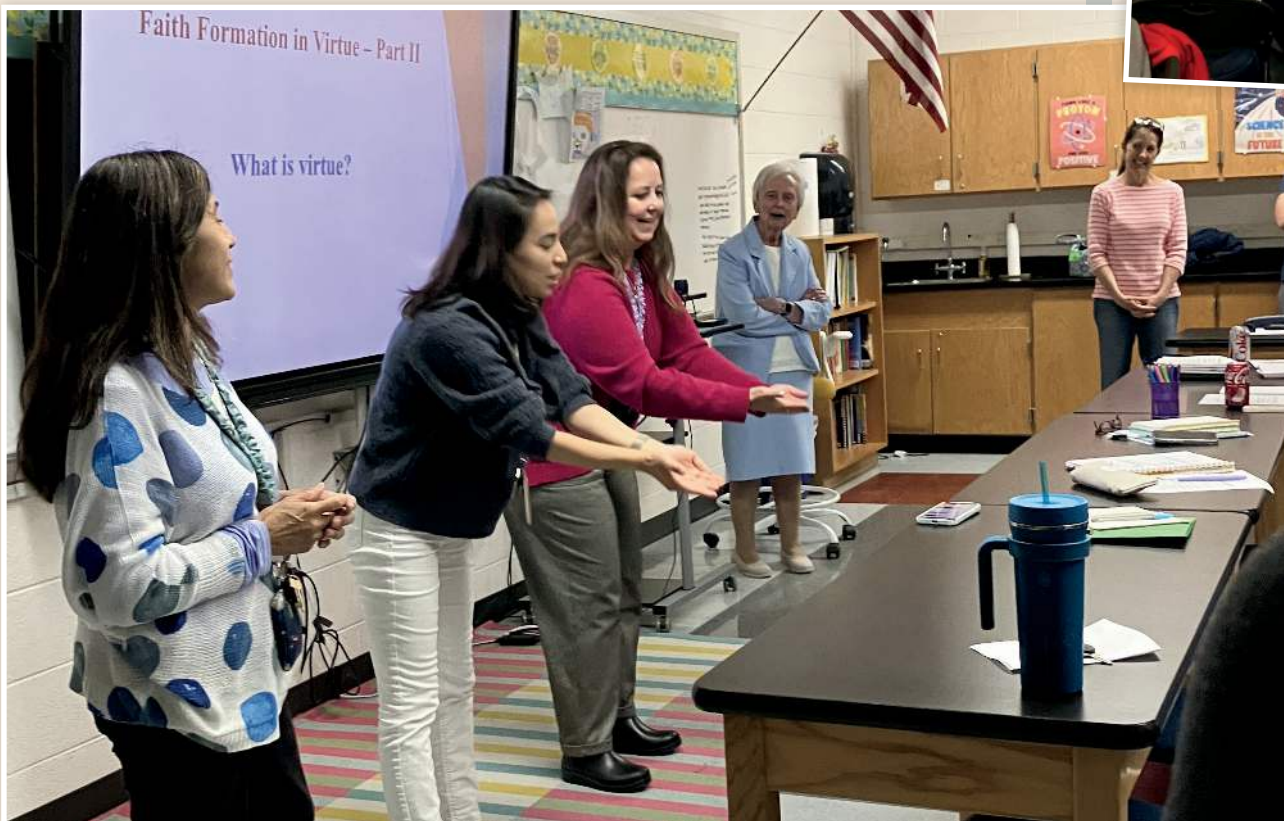
Sr. Patricia emphasized that students learn virtues best by watching the examples we set. She encouraged us to model faith, fortitude, and charity through kindness, patience, respect, and service in our everyday interactions so that our students may grow in these virtues as well.

With this in mind and as part of our ongoing commitment to Catholic identity, next school year we have decided that as a school, we will focus on one schoolwide virtue each trimester. All grade levels will explore and practice the same virtue through classroom learning and daily school life as we continue building a community rooted in faith and character. We are excited to see our school family grow with God's grace.

15th Catechesis
May 27, 2026

Pope Leo, in his General Audiences on Wednesdays, is giving a catechesis on Vatican II, sixty years later.

III. Dogmatic Constitution *Sacrosanctum concilium*.

2. *The reform of the liturgy: tradition and development*

Dear brothers and sisters, good morning and welcome!

In the Encyclical *Mediator Dei*, the Venerable Pius XII writes that “the Church is without question a living organism, and as an organism, in respect of the sacred liturgy also, she grows, matures, develops, adapts and accommodates herself to temporal needs and circumstances, provided only that the integrity of her doctrine be safeguarded” (no. 59).

In full accordance with this principle, the Second Vatican Council, in the Introduction to the Constitution *Sacrosanctum concilium* (SC), recognizes “particularly cogent reasons for undertaking the reform and promotion of the liturgy” (no. 1). The Council assembly was gathered, in fact, with the desire to “impart an ever increasing vigor to the Christian life of the faithful; to adapt more suitably to the needs of our own times those institutions which are subject to change; to foster whatever can promote union among all who believe in Christ; to strengthen whatever can help to call the whole of mankind into the household of the Church” (ibid.).

At that moment in history, there was a strong sense of the need for a renewal of the ritual forms through which, for centuries, the Church had glorified God and sanctified the Christian people. Thanks to the Liturgical Movement, the conviction had matured—later expressed by Saint John Paul II—that “a very close and organic bond exists between the renewal of the liturgy and the renewal of the whole life of the Church. The Church not only acts but also expresses herself in the liturgy, lives by the liturgy and draws from the liturgy the strength for her life” (Letter *Dominicae cenae*).

To encourage the access of the faithful to the richness of the gifts of grace dispensed by the sacred liturgy, the Constitution *Sacrosanctum concilium* thus indicates, with a very effective phrase, the direction to take: “That sound tradition may be retained, and yet the way remain open to legitimate progress” (SC, 23).

Pope Benedict XVI grasped in this declaration of intent the “reform programme” of the Council Fathers, “a balance between the great liturgical tradition of the past and that of the future,” noting that “tradition and progress are often clumsily opposed,” whereas “actually, the two concepts merge: tradition is a living reality, which therefore includes in itself the principle of development, of progress. It is as if to say that the river of tradition also carries its source in itself and flows towards the outlet” (Address to participants in the Congress promoted by the Pontifical Athenaeum of Saint Anselm on the 50th anniversary of foundation, 6 May 2011).

The Council affirms the legitimacy of this progress, rooted in authentic Tradition, distinguishing within the liturgy “immutable elements, divinely instituted” from “elements subject to change [which] not only may but ought to be changed with the passage of time if they have suffered from the intrusion of anything out of harmony with the inner nature of the liturgy or have become unsuited to it” (SC, 21). Changes of this type have taken place constantly over the centuries in order to enable the faithful to participate fruitfully, through ritual actions, in the Paschal Mystery of Christ, the foundation of the Christian faith. The Church’s worship has thus been “embodied” in the cultural forms of each age and has been able to influence them and even transform them. The liturgy has thus been, for centuries, a driving force for evangelization. Today, this energy must be renewed in continuity with the authentic and living Catholic tradition, that is, in accordance with a dynamic aimed at introducing believers to the fullness of the truth.

It is therefore understandable why the Council Fathers recommended that the revision of the rites, when “the good of the Church genuinely and certainly requires them”, must be carried out taking care that “any new forms adopted should in some way grow organically from forms already existing” (SC, 23). For the good of the entire Church, every reform must always be preceded by careful “theological, historical and pastoral” investigation (ibid.). The Council Magisterium, in this way, thus calls for the avoidance of confusion amongst the faithful, discouraging anyone from adding, removing or altering anything in liturgical

matters on their own initiative (cf. SC, 22). The progress evoked in the Conciliar Constitution in no way compromises ecclesial communion: rather, it seeks to confirm and foster it.

I therefore urge all those called to prepare the celebration of the divine mysteries, in particular priests who exercise the ministry of liturgical presidency, to always uphold that respect for the texts and regulations of the liturgy which springs from an inner attitude of openness and trust in God, manifesting humility before His greatness and sincere fidelity to ecclesial communion.

I entrust all peoples stricken by war to the protection of the Virgin Mary, Queen of Peace.

Building access for all: an elevator for our school

Our parish school, proudly serving generations of families since its construction in 1961, has long been a place of learning, faith, and community. As we continue to grow and reflect on our mission, we are called to ensure that our facilities fully welcome and serve every member of our parish community. One important step in that effort is improving accessibility throughout our school building.

Currently, access to the upper floors of our school is limited for individuals with mobility challenges. This creates barriers for students, parents, staff, and visitors who may rely on accessible features to fully participate in school life. In keeping with the principles of inclusion and dignity for all, we are exploring the addition of an elevator to provide access in accordance with ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) standards.

Installing an elevator in a building originally constructed over six decades ago presents both challenges and opportunities. While the structure was not designed with modern accessibility needs in mind, advancements in engineering and thoughtful planning now make it possible to retrofit older buildings in ways that preserve their character while improving functionality. This project would allow all members of our Catholic parish and school community — regardless of physical ability — to move freely and safely throughout the school.

Beyond compliance with accessibility standards, this initiative reflects our deeper values as a faith-based community. We believe that every individual is created with inherent dignity and deserves equal access to education, worship, and community life. An elevator is more than a mechanical addition; it is a visible commitment to hospitality, inclusion, and care for one another.

We invite you to join us in this important effort. Whether through your ideas, prayers, or support, your involvement will help make our parish school more accessible and welcoming for all — now and for generations to come. Please contact Fr. Don at frdonrooney@stbernapar.org for more information.

Magnifica Humanitas

The Encyclical of Pope Leo XIV on safeguarding the human person in the time of artificial intelligence

The dignity of the human being as the criterion to orient technical progress

Pope Leo XIV, in presenting to the world and to all the people of God, his first Encyclical Letter, focused on the care for the human person in the time of Artificial Intelligence, said "I invite all members of the Church and of the human family: let us learn to listen to one another, face the present challenges with courage, and cooperate in building a more human and fraternal society. [...] Please take with you a commitment to stay awake and, as 'artisans of hope,' to keep on building the worksite of our time. May the Spirit of the Risen Lord Jesus sustain our work together."

Part 1 of 5

In the time of Artificial Intelligence, humanity is faced with a choice. Whether to let itself be guided by technology and progress as the only principles on which to build our civilization, or should it put at the center **the dignity of the person**, reducing technical progress to an instrument. To explain this, Pope Leo uses two biblical images, one the construction of the Tower of Babel and the other the reconstruction of Jerusalem.

Choosing the "right" road requires a **DYNAMIC APPROACH** (chapter 1), which looks to the Social Doctrine of the Church following the teachings of the Second Vatican Council: listening to, discerning, and interpreting our times in light of the Gospel, in order to be able to return to humanity the revealed truth, while using the terms of the present.

Consecration of the United States to the Sacred Heart of Jesus

In a historic moment, the U.S. bishops will consecrate the United States to the Sacred Heart of Jesus on Thursday, June 11, 2026, and invite all to join in this consecration.

As we look forward to our country's 250th Anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence and the consecration of our country to the Sacred Heart on June 11, Bishop Burbidge has asked us to provide you with resources to mark this historic moment in our parishes. Here at Saint Bernadette we will celebrate Masses that Thursday at 7 and 9am using the prayers that will be prayed by the bishops of the United States, as well as the consecration prayer.

We reprinted the first 8 days of the **Novena to the Sacred Heart of Jesus** prayers in [last week's bulletin](#). The novena began on Wednesday, June 3, and draws its daily devotions from the Litany of the Sacred Heart and includes reflections by various saints and popes.

The **Litany of the Sacred Heart** as well as the **Prayer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus** may be recited each day in preparation for June 11, the day of the consecration.

JUNE 11
Heart of Jesus, aflame with love for us

Pray

Today, we consecrate the United States of America to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. Parishes and individuals around the country are encouraged to join the U.S. Catholic bishops in this historic occasion, beginning with this Prayer to the Sacred Heart of Jesus written for the consecration:

Lord, I come to your tender Heart today, O Most Sacred Heart of Jesus: You know the longings of our hearts, and you desire that we enjoy friendship with you. From your pierced side, you have poured out the

wellspring of life, for which we thirst. Your heart burns with a love for all people to return to a right relationship with you.

We celebrate the abundant gifts you have given this nation, founded on the self-evident truths that our Creator has endowed all people with the right to life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness. We make reparation for the offenses against you and against human dignity that have taken place in this nation. May our hearts be united to yours, so that our families and communities enjoy peace and happiness; may broken relationships be reconciled, injustices repaired, and the wounds of our land be healed. May your holy Catholic Church serve as a sign, pointing all people to your infinite love.

O Desire of Nations and Center of History, we ask you to bless these United States of America. Who live and reign with God the Father in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen. Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us! Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us!

Learn

Why do we consecrate to the Sacred Heart of Jesus? In the first such act in 1899, when Pope Leo XIII consecrated the world to the Sacred Heart of Jesus, he writes in his encyclical, *Annum sacrum*: "Since there is in the Sacred Heart a symbol and the express image of the infinite love of Jesus Christ that moves us to love one another, it is fit and proper that we should consecrate ourselves to his most Sacred Heart – an act that is nothing else than an offering and a binding of oneself to Jesus Christ."

Likewise, in Saint John Paul II's Message for the Centenary of the Consecration of the Human Race to the Divine Heart of Jesus, he reflected on the need for a missionary spirit of the Church that flows from consecration to the Sacred Heart: "Consecration thus understood is to be joined to the missionary activity of the Church herself, because it answers the desire of Jesus' Heart to propagate in the world, through the members of his Body, his total dedication to the kingdom, and to unite the Church ever more closely to his offering to the Father and his being for others."

In addition to drawing us into deeper unity with Christ, consecration to the Sacred Heart also reveals a message that Saint John Paul II called "necessary for humanity today": Only in Christ's love can we discover the gentle-



ness and forgiveness needed to heal the conflicts that wound our world (Angelus 2002).

Act

As we conclude this Novena to the Sacred Heart, we reflect with Pope Francis in *Dilexit nos*. "There are moments when [Jesus] speaks to us inwardly, calls us and leads us to a better place. That better place is his heart. There he invites us to find fresh strength and peace: 'Come to me, all who are weary and are carrying heavy burdens, and I will give you rest' (Mt 11:28)" (no. 43).

Let us go forth with this renewed sense of strength and peace, consoled by the great love that Jesus has for us and transformed by the missionary fire of his Sacred Heart.
